Maps of the Sea Simon Soon

This is an early attempt at compiling a list of exhibitions, conferences, publications and related events where modern and contemporary art in Southeast Asia countries are mapped regionally – within the discursive and disciplinary frameworks of either Southeast Asia (primary) and/or Asia (secondary).

Instead of thinking about the development of modern art exclusively within the national, these regional overlays construct an expanded form of narrative that largely based itself on discursive models that are either comparative (different developments of what national is in terms of cultural production) and/or essentialist (trying to seek out commonalities amongst the selected area of study).

As Southeast Asia, a geo-political/cultural concept that gained currency in the Post-war period, has been continuously reinvented in political, economic and cultural usages, conversations pertaining to its significance and relevance are in themselves useful in decentering the study of modern art solely within the national while at the same time proposing a disciplinary field that is at least categorically useful to complicate how the development of modern and the contemporary art outside of Europe and America can be discussed and understood.
